### Radcliffe residents make their views heard

On Thursday 19th October, the residents of Radcliffe on Trent had the opportunity to make their views known in a referendum on their Neighbourhood Plan. Of those that braved the very wet weather, 91% voted to support the Plan and this now becomes an official part of the Borough Council's planning process.

The Radcliffe Neighbourhood Plan is sponsored by the Parish Council and has been produced over the last three years by a Steering Committee, with support from Rushcliffe Borough Council, local residents, Rural Community Action Nottinghamshire (RCAN), and Urban Imprint Planning Consultants. Neighbourhood Plans were introduced by the Localism Act 2011 and are funded by the government. They are being developed across the UK and give local people real powers to shape the future of their neighbourhoods. The Radcliffe Neighbourhood Plan will now be incorporated into the Rushcliffe Borough Council's Planning Policy and it should have a significant influence in how future development is carried out in the village.

The Neighbourhood Plan contains a vision statement for Radcliffe as 'a vibrant and sustainable village with a strong sense of community cohesion and rural identity'. It contains fifteen planning policies concerning the village centre, recreation and the environment, transport, housing, and design and heritage.

Borough Councillor Roger Upton, Chairman of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Committee, said: 'This is an exciting time for Radcliffe on Trent. The local community has approved their Neighbourhood Plan and this will give local people a say on how their village is developed in the future'. Roger also wanted to personally recognise 'the contribution of local people over the last 3 years and thank everyone who has been involved'.

David Barton, Chairman of the Parish Council said: 'I am delighted that Radcliffe residents have given such a ringing endorsement to our Neighbourhood Plan. I would like to add my thanks to all those who worked so hard over several years to draw it up. It is now for us all to continue working for the future development of our village, to ensure that it meets current and future needs and aspirations'.

#### PLANNING AND ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE

The Committee covers consideration of:

- Planning matters: commenting on planning applications and strategic planning issues, such as the Local Development Plan (see below), the Green Belt Review and Minerals Planning issues. We have also contributed to the development of the Neighbourhood Plan (see below).
- Environmental issues: these include train and bus services (see below), parking, road pedestrian crossings (see below), footpaths (see below), road works (see below), flooding, water and sewerage, oil/gas extraction and improvement to the way that the village looks. Many of these issues are interlinked.

Local Development Plan Part 2: Consultations are underway for the Rushcliffe Local Plan Part 2: Land and Planning Policies. I hope you were able to attend the consultation at the Grange Hall on 31 October. The main consequence of the new Plan is with regard to Housing Land Supply. The Plan proposes that Radcliffe should have 820 new homes. These are likely to be located i) north of Nottingham Road, north east of the RSPCA (c. 150 homes); ii) adjacent to Grooms Cottage south of Shelford Road at the NE edge of the village (50 homes), iii) south of Shelford Road at the NE edge of the village (400 homes), iv) north of Grantham Road, south of the railway, at the eastern edge of the village (140 homes, v) near 72 Main Road, south west of Wharf Lane (5 homes), and vi) at the Paddock, south of Nottingham Road and north of the A52 (75 homes). Most of these homes will be located on what is currently Green Belt land, which is currently under review. However, the issue for the village is not simply the number of homes to be built and the increased number of residents but the effects that this expansion will have on transport facilities, health provision, schools and leisure facilities. The Parish Council is acutely aware of the future challenges and began discussions with Rushcliffe Borough Council some time ago. If you have concerns, do not hesitate to contact myself, Keith Agar or other members of the Planning and Environment Committee.

*Neighbourhood Plan*: I am delighted to inform you that Radcliffe-on-Trent's Neighbourhood Plan was approved by the Radcliffe electorate by 1900 (90.8%) to 190 (9.1%) votes with two spoilt ballots and a 32.67% turnout.

This means that the Plan has been formally accepted and is part of the Rushcliffe Local Plan. It will strongly influence planning and development in the village over the next ten years. If you haven't had a chance to look at it yet, it can be read on the Parish Council and Rushcliffe Borough Council websites. I anticipate that the Parish Council will also have a paper copy for public consultation.


*Train Working Group; Local Station Adoption Group:* Volunteers from Network Rail and East Midlands Trains have agreed to help the Radcliffe Station Adoption Group carry out a major 'tidy up' including cutting back vegetation and repainting the fences on November 10th. In addition, the Poacher Line (Nottingham to Skegness Line) Community Rail Project has agreed a grant of £500 to allow us to build a raised garden bed, which is planned to be a herb garden for the local community. The Radcliffe Station Adoption Group are also seeking donations of planters by individuals or groups.

*Train Working Group; new East Midlands rail franchise:* There is currently a consultation underway by the Department for Transport with regard to the contract to run train services in the East Midlands. This includes the Nottingham to Skegness Line that pass through Radcliffe. The Parish Council's Train Working Group has attended many meetings about the new contract and recently submitted an extensive set of comments. Our main recommendations are that Radcliffe should have an hourly service in both directions throughout the day and into the early evening, a half hourly service during the rush hour periods, a late evening train and an hourly service on Sundays from 10 am. We have also recommended improvements to the station (particularly the ramp down to the platform on the north side) and to the car park, improved rolling stock and the facility to buy tickets on the platforms.

*Pedestrian crossings:* Although I am writing as construction begins for the pedestrian crossing at the bottom of Shelford Road, near the mini roundabout, I hope that by the time you read this, the crossing will be in operation. In the months ahead we shall be having a third pedestrian crossing opposite the old Black Lion (Tesco's shop.). The date for construction is not set but I hope that it will be completed by the end of March.

*Cliff Walk footpath:* Because of the very long delays in completing the road works at the RSPCA and Cropwell Road junctions, Highways England has agreed to widen and resurface the path along the Cliff Walk. We are told that the work will take about four weeks and will start in November. While this is a significant benefit for the village, costing about £150 000, it doesn't really compensate those villagers who live close to the junctions for the long-term disturbance and diversions.

## Behind the scenes at Rockley Memorial Park Commemoration 15th October 2017

On 15th October Radcliffe on Trent commemorated the centenary of William Rockley's death at Passchendaele and celebrated ninety years since Rockley Memorial Park was opened. A commemorative service organised by Radcliffe on Trent Parish Council and ably conducted by Dave Barton, chairman, was held at the park. Rockley Memorial Park was donated to the village in 1927 by Lisle Rockley to honour his son William and all the men from the village who lost their lives as a result of the Great War. A large crowd of over two hundred attended the afternoon ceremony.

Radcliffe on Trent WWI Group was busy in the months leading up to the ceremony researching the history of the park. Their search began with Marion Caunt, Rosie Collins and Pauline Woodhouse visiting the National Archives at Kew to examine military records of WWI officers connected with the village, including Lieutenant William Rockley. He was an officer in the 10th Battalion of the York and Lancaster Regiment. The researchers discovered fresh information about his service in Gallipoli, his subsequent illnesses and previously unknown details about his death during the 3rd Battle of Ypres.

The York and Lancaster Regiment is now part of The Yorkshire Regiment and a representative, Major R.C.Helm, gave a short speech at the ceremony. He told the assembled crowd that it was a great honour to be there representing his regiment and that William Rockley's Military Cross citation was being read that day to troops from the regiment stationed in Afghanistan. Meanwhile in Belgium that weekend Jason King, retired history teacher at Dayncourt School, took a group of young people to Tyne Cot Memorial where William Rockley is remembered and told them his story.

Radcliffe WWI Group gradually built up the story of the Rockley family by using methods generally employed by people doing family history research: studying censuses, electoral registers, wills and birth, marriage and death certificates. Very little was known about Lisle Rockley and the group was aware that he had often been identified erroneously as a builder living in the village. A detailed study of newspaper reports from the 1890s to the 1930s gradually revealed that he was a successful business man in the billposter





and advertising industry and owned several companies under the umbrella of Rockley's Limited. The researchers carried out a simultaneous investigation into how land in the village was acquired by Mr. Rockley and transformed into a park, cliff walk and woodlands with access to the river. The investigation is ongoing as more documents come to light and fresh discoveries about the history of the park are made.

During their research, the Radcliffe WWI group managed to trace Lisle Rockley's descendants and found the Linney family who were then invited by the Parish Council to attend the ceremony. Four descendants of Lisle Rockley were present: Fiona Linney, great-granddaughter, Charles Linney, Lisle Rockley's great-great grandson and his two children. Charles Linney laid a wreath in the park pavilion on behalf of the family. The crowd was moved by the simple ceremony which concluded with bugler Andy Norton from the Boys Brigade sounding 'The Last Post'.

Radcliffe residents Michael Bedford, Richard Caunt and Clive Holland photographed the ceremony. Afterwards all present re-convened at Grange Hall where Radcliffe WWI group presented a poster exhibition detailing the history of the park from William Rockley's death to the present day.

On display were artefacts belonging to William Rockley and now in the possession of his descendants. The items included his ceremonial sword, which Charles Linney's father, Nick Linney, had had refurbished through Wilkinson Sword for the occasion, his M.C. and campaign medals. The wreath laid at the pavilion was brought to the hall. It was made at The Flower Room, Shelford Road and designed using information provided by the ROT WWI group about the original wreath presented by Mrs Margaret Rockley in 1927. The portrait of Lisle Rockley on display was a copy of a photo belonging to the Linney family which was then enhanced by Radcliffe resident Richard Caunt and framed by local company LizArc. It now hangs in the Dowson Room at the Grange.

Following a welcome by Dave Barton, Rosie Collins gave a short talk about the history of the park. In conclusion, she said:



'I'd like to re-iterate how deeply grateful we are to Lisle Rockley for the wonderful gift of the park, cliff walk, woodlands, and access to the River Trent. The gift enhances our experience of living in Radcliffe by giving all of us an area of outstanding natural beauty to enjoy. It's now up to us to preserve our heritage in the best way that we can.'

John Thorn, chairman of Radcliffe Parish Council Amenities Committee then described recent improvements and plans for the development of the park. After the talks, those present enjoyed a splendid tea provided by Radcliffe on Trent Women's Institute.

There was ample opportunity for people to look at the exhibition, buy '*The Story of Rockley Memorial Park, Cliffs and Woodlands*' and to sign up for a new voluntary group, the 'Friends of Rockley Memorial Park' who will undertake light gardening duties in the park in future. Contact Jacki Grice at the Parish Council office if you would like to add your name to the list of volunteers.

At the end of the day, when everyone had gone home, Marion Caunt, Rosie Collins and Pauline Woodhouse placed William Rockley's wreath on Radcliffe War Memorial to signify the fact that Rockley Memorial Park honours all Radcliffe WWI servicemen who lost their lives.

## Charles Linney's speech at the 90th anniversary

Firstly can I say a heart-felt thank you on behalf of our family, to everyone for making the effort to come and mark the one hundredth anniversary of the death of my Great, Great Uncle, Lieutenant William Lisle Rockley, as well as for all the other people from the local Radcliffe area who lost their life while fighting for their country?

Today is my first visit to the Rockley Memorial Park and it is obvious to see, just how much thought has gone in to making these gardens look so fantastic,. Thank you to those who are responsible for its upkeep.

I would also like say thank you to the researchers who have spent a great deal of time looking into the history of Lieutenant Rockley's life. We are very much looking forward to reading the book about him, and learning more about our family's history.

William achieved so much in his short life, but I can only begin to imagine the impact his death had on our family, and for all the other families who lost loved ones during the war. I know from discussing it with older family members that life was never the same for that generation.

This Park is a great memorial to all the local people who didn't return from the war and we are very proud to be associated with it.

This year in June my Father and Auntie paid a visit to Tyne Cot cemetery and looking though their photos the sheer magnitude of lives lost is overwhelming.

My great Grandmother's ashes are scattered, finally reuniting her with her beloved, brother and I am sure that this inspirational park will continue to bring pleasure to all those who use it now, and their future generations, for at least another hundred years.

## RADCLIFFE ARCHAEOLOGICAL PROJECT

During the last 2 years RAP has dug 13 test pits in and around Radcliffe. We are aiming to determine where and when Radcliffe began. Experts state that most of the villages in this area developed between the 7th and 9th Century AD. At this point nomadic family groups settled and began to farm the slopes of the Trent valley. By 1086, [The Domesday Book], Radcliffe was described as a large settlement with Lamcote and Saxondale smaller in size.

We unearthed Neolithic flints, [2,500 to 4,00 years old], plenty of animal bones and clay pipes, pottery from the 13th Century to modern day, but no Early Medieval pottery. The crucial time period in which we really needed to find artifacts was proving elusive - until August 2017 when we finally found a spinner's whorl in the grounds of Grange Hall.

The Spinner's whorl, [see below] has been dated at between 5th and 10th Century, but is more likely to be earlier rather than later as it is crudely made with no decoration. The spinner would have pushed a piece of wood through the hole and the spun wool was wound around the stick. The weight of the whorl, which is made of lead, would have stretched the thread as she twisted it in her fingers. This is the first evidence of industry in Radcliffe and is a really exciting find.

The Scheduled Appointments Service frees up police officers' time, enabling them to resolve more incidents more quickly than they could if they travelled to see everyone who is a victim of crime.

## **RADCLIFFE CONSERVATION GROUP**

We are an informal group of mainly Radcliffe residents who work on a voluntary basis to help maintain our local green spaces. While certain areas like the Cliff Top are directly maintained by the Parish Council and designated public footpaths receive some periodic attention from Nottinghamshire County Council, other areas of real conservation value face considerable challenges. We feel there is plenty of scope for the community to contribute to the health of our local environment so that we and future generations continue to benefit from it. Much of our effort is concentrated on the riverside and Lily Ponds but is likely to extend to Dewberry Hill. Activities include maintenance of pathways to facilitate access for both walkers and anglers, litter clearance, control of invasive non-native Himalayan Balsam as well as amphibian / wildlife surveys.

The Group holds a work session most months, usually on the first Sunday morning of the month and tools are provided. #### Report from the Chairman of the Amenities Committee

#### 90th Anniversary of the Rockley Park

The book recently produced by the RoT WW1 History Group, which is available for sale in the village, gives a wonderful account of how the Rockley Memorial Park has developed over the 90 years since its opening. it includes an interesting description of the various contributions its gardeners have made, bringing us right up to date with the appointment of Jenny Ellis as Head Gardener in 2017. It describes a number of the new ideas that Jenny has brought, such as the orchard planted where we used to keep a great pile of brash, and the new round raised flower bed near the entrance to the park in which she planted out a floral badge of William Rockley's York and Lancaster Regiment.

The Parish Council is very much aware that the Memorial Park is the "Jewel in the Crown" of the village's Amenities and we are very conscious that not only is the park a beautiful place, it is also a very rare place. Very few villages in the country have anything approaching such a lovely park and in many places, and for various reasons, parks have disappeared or have not been looked after well and as a result have been a diminishing amenity. Not so with our Rockley Memorial Park, which we try to keep in the spirit of Lisle Rockley's vision that the park should be a memorial that would look to the future and be a joy to the living as well as a memorial to the dead.

For this reason the park has to continue to develop and be relevant to the needs of the village today, while continuing to be a beautiful place. If you look at the photograph of the park as it was when it was first opened it is surprising to see how relatively tree-less it was then, whereas now it could fairly be described as an Arboretum with its great array and variety of mature trees. However under Jenny's management near the entrance to the park we have removed a number of mature Yews and cut a number of others back to bush size. This was because all gardens need managing, sometimes rather dramatically. Actually all of those trees were self seeded and they had really overtaken the entrance area. By removing them, opening up the entrance area to the light, planting the raised York and Lancaster bed, and putting tiered herbaceous planting on both sides of the entrance gate the aim is to

make the entrance area as beautiful and colourful as the main oval of the park itself.

Going forward our plan is to develop more colour in the park all year round. The present Autumn colour of the trees is wonderful, as is the Spring flowering, and we want to bring as much Winter colour into the park as we can. We also want to make the park more interesting to children. It should never stop being a place of quiet contemplation for adults, but it also needs to appeal to families and the younger members of the community. Gone are the days of the park-keeper imagining every child is out for mischief and chasing them out of the park!

We also intend to make the woodland walks more wildlife friendly and to encourage a more birds to live in the park. We already have bird feeders but we will take further advice about ensuring the habitat is optimum for nesting. This would be very much in keeping with Lisle Rockley's own interest in making the cliff area attractive to birds. And of course the "Picnic in the Park" we held earlier this summer was so successful that we intend to make the event a part of the ongoing life of the park too.

None of this means wholesale or drastic change, it will be gradual development. I am very encouraged by the recent interest of a number of people in becoming "Friends of Rockley Memorial Park" they will make a contribution to helping Jenny and our new gardener, Matt, to take these ideas forward, just in the way the Conservation Volunteers have helped the Parish Council to manage the Lily Ponds as a place that is both a wildlife sanctuary and a place that the village residents can enjoy.

In this way I trust that the Parish Council has kept, and will continue to keep, both the park and the cliff walk true to the extraordinary vision that Lisle Rockley had when he so generously gave them to our village.

#### The LilyPonds and Dewberry Hill

I must say a big thank you to the Conservation volunteers, without whom the path down from the Hallowell Steps to the Lily Ponds area would be a complete quagmire. In October 12 volunteers dragged at least a ton of bark

chippings down the steps in builders bags and spread them on the muddy path at the bottom to make it walkable. They have also cleared enormous amounts of invasive Himalayan Balsam away and cut back other vegetation which would otherwise take over the paths. Although the ponds are a wildlife area we have to keep the "wilderness" managed!

The Conservation Volunteers are also going to be active on Dewberry Hill, another Radcliffe nature reserve that, probably, fewer residents are familiar with. This is the area between the Harlequin and the golf course, with access from Cropwell Road and Woodland Close. The Parish Council acquired it a few years ago on a pepper corn rent from the County Council in a very unmanaged state and, following advice from The Notts Wildlife Trust, we have cleared paths, cut meadow areas, removed invasive saplings and dangerous trees, and generally thinned some of the scrub to enhance both the wildlife habitat and make the area more accessible and pleasant as an area for walking. We feel we have got it into a state where volunteers can make a contribution to its development and one of their first ideas to is to replant *Dewberries* on the hill! Dewberries are quite rare smaller relatives of the blackberry and, despite its name, we have had not had them on the hill in living memory. The volunteers will plant a small test sample and we will see how they get on.

#### The Cliff Path

It is said that every cloud has a silver lining and one positive outcome of the cloud that hung over the village in the form of the road works on the A52, and caused particular problems for those residents who lived close to the work, has been that by way of recognition of this upset the company responsible for the work has agreed to carry out a complete replacement, including widening, of the cliff path. The path has been in need of a bit of TLC for a while now and the replacement being undertaken would have cost us about £150,000. The company has also repaired a large sink hole near the Slack Hollow steps. I hope that residents disturbed by the works will be able to come to the cliffs to enjoy the new path when it is complete.

## Radfest 2K17

Many thanks Radcliffe on Trent for all your amazing support with Radfest 2K17 on Saturday 15th July. We had well over 1700 at The Rec and around half were under 18s. It was brilliant to see so many smiles from tiny tots dancing in front of the stage to some of our volunteers. Massive thanks to the artists: Super Furniture, BABE PUNCH, Tom McCartney, Lowrie, Major Oak, Sunflower Thieves, Guy Ellerton, The Dandy Lions and Aimee Stones for your great efforts; you had the youth and villagers begging for more!

The Dandy Lions attracted lots of attention, particularly from the younger generation. The Lead Singer said 'The Hi-di-Hi' will be up there with my all time faves, as well as being swamped by kids, when I gave out the sweets!'.

Students from South Nottinghamshire Academy wrote previews on the bands before the event and produced some exceptional pieces of writing. They were given the opportunity to interview the bands and singers as they came off stage.The reviewers had VIP wristbands and got back-stage access throughout the day.

We could not have staged this event without all the volunteers; our village did us proud and you turned up en masse to help out from set-up at 7 am to clear down at 9-30 pm. There were marshals, design and technical teams, site decorators, litter pickers - the list is endless. We had help from the teens to those in the 3rd Age - Radcliffe on Trent: you rock!

We'd like to make a special mention of the support and tolerance of the Park Home residents and others living along Wharf Lane. We were delighted that lots of residents came along on the day and we've heard that those who weren't physically able to make it had their windows wide open, so they could feel part of it. One resident even contacted us before the event to ask which way the stage was facing, as she hoped to be able to see and hear her grandson, who was playing.

We've had many comments saying that it was like having our own mini-Glastonbury in the village and our volunteers worked hard to create the festival look. A creative team was recruited from South Notts Academy to help prepare the site. They spent many hours along with our volunteers to make The Rec look authentic. We had windmills, balloons, ribbon and bunting galore and a big hit was most definitely the 'chill out zone' with comfy sofas and tables in prime view of the stage.

The Festival was run in partnership with the students at the excellent and acclaimed Confetti College in Nottingham; the acts were some of

Nottingham's best new music; we even had a performance from Radcliffe's very own Tom McCartney, who is quite a legend and described by one villager as Bluesman De Luxe, reminiscent of Eric Clapton playing his Cherry Red Telecaster with the Yardbirds.

**British Swimming Head Coach Bill Furniss** has been awarded an OBE in recognition of his dedication to sport in a career at the top that spans more than 30 years.

Bill was named within the Queen's Birthday Honours after leading the athlete and coaching staff to Great Britain's most successful Olympics for more than 100 years at the Rio 2016 Games.

Bill is a vastly experienced coach, having worked at international level for more than three decades. Prior his position with British Swimming he was the head coach of the Nova Centurion Swimming Club in Nottingham. He has worked with a number of highly successful athletes, most notably four time Olympic medallist Rebecca Adlington.




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
