Save Radcliffe Swimming Pool Campaign Update

On 5th February, Radcliffe-on-Trent Parish Council held a public open meeting to discuss the issue of Radcliffe-on-Trent pool closure. In attendance were local councillors, South Nottinghamshire Academy (SNA), Radcliffe-on-Trent Swimming Pool Association (ROTSPA) and approximately 100 residents of Radcliffe-on-Trent.

The swimming pool was built in 1973 with funds raised by the Radcliffe community over a number of years as well as some funding from the local authority. Since the school became an Academy Trust in 2011, the pool is owned by them and pay a large part of its running costs. 300+ people use the pool a week, through private swimming lessons and public sessions.

Save Radcliffe **Swimming Pool Group** was formed at the end of December 2013, when the news of the proposed demolition of the swimming pool was announced. A petition has been set up to explore the Radcliffe community's support for the pool, raise awareness to the community of the proposal, ask SNA to reconsider the location of the rebuild of the school and allow local residents the opportunity to keep the pool open and available for community use, without any consequence to the new school build.

Local residents raised issues and their concerns they have if the pool is to be demolished, such as how would swimming on the school curriculum be achieved and lack of leisure facilities in Radcliffe.

Radcliffe Parish Council are to hold an initial meeting for a working group to look into the feasibility of all the options raised in the meeting; the possibility that the new school build plans are altered to accommodate the pool and that SNA provide compensation by way of land for a new pool to be built by the community. A plea has gone out for interested parties and members of the community to make up this working group, with support of local councillors.

The weather continues to be challenging, we have been fortunate to date not to have lost any major trees, but the wet conditions prove very difficult in the maintenance of our grounds.

Recent decisions concerning housing development and the possible loss of leisure facilities have resulted in much discussion and community interest. Whatever the outcome of these decisions, we must try to nurture the enthusiasm and concern that exists in our village. The future provision of leisure and amenity facilities will be challenging on many fronts not least finance, but this should not deter the aspirations of the community and the Parish Council. A Community group Working Party is to be set up, with Parish Council representation, to investigate the possible provision of a new pool on the South Nottinghamshire Academy site.

The Trim Trail recently installed at Valley Road has been a huge hit, and new picnic bench is due to be installed any time. All safety surfaces will be inspected and a programme of renewal will take place where necessary. A survey of wild life is to be undertaken on Cliff top, Lily ponds and Dewberry Hill, so do keep us informed of any sightings.

AN EXCITING TIME AHEAD FOR RADCLIFFE SCOUTS

With the re-development of South Nottinghamshire Academy due to begin later this year, Radcliffe Scouts are looking to the future and are hoping to use some of the surplus land to build a new Scout Hall. The aim is to provide an environmentally friendly building which would provide an excellent venue for Scouting for the young people of Radcliffe over the years to come as well as a facility for other community uses.

We have had some very positive discussions with the school, but there is still a tremendous amount to be done if our plans are to be successful. We would therefore like to hear from anyone who would like to help us, in any way, however small, whether or not they are currently involved with the Scout Group. Our intention would be to sell our existing premises but this is unlikely to raise enough money to pay for a new building, so raising funds from other sources will be vital. The project will also take careful management, as well as technical, legal and other skills, and we would ideally like to involve as many people from the Radcliffe community as possible. Specific skills aren't necessary though; we are just looking for people with enthusiasm and a willingness to get involved.

Parish Clerk's Report

Best Kept Village Competition - The Parish Council has once again entered the annual competition and encourages residents and businesses to support the application as we endeavour to win for a third consecutive year.

Work continues on enhancing the village amenities, recent projects include:

Clearance work at Rockley Park Pavilion and Greenhouse areas

Enhancement of Public Toilets at Rockley Park
Bingham Road Triangle clearance of dead hedgerow
New Picnic Bench and Litter Bin at Valley Road Play Area

The Parish Council has also just tasked a Consultant to survey the trees under our responsibility so that we can undertake a scheduled programme of any necessary works.



Scoop the Poop - Unfortunately a big concern in the village currently is the increase of dog fouling in our green spaces, pavements and play areas. Dog fouling causes many problems, it can get on your shoes and clothes, or in the worse cases it can lead to blindness due to an infection called 'Toxocara Canis'.

The Rushcliffe Borough Dog Fouling Order was introduced in 1998. An on the spot fine of £50, or a fine of up to £1,000 on prosecution applies if you allow your dog to foul in a public place and you fail to clean it up straight away.

Always take a bag with you to clear up your dog's

mess. The Council provides a number of dog bins for you to dispose of the bags.

Lily Ponds – A future proposed project is to install an information board on all the local wildlife in this area. We are starting to collate information and would love to hear from you if you happen to come across anything of interest.

Planting - We would like to thank the Rushcliffe Borough Council Biodiversity Grant Scheme for their contribution of £400 towards the planting of native species in the village and also the Greenwood Community Grant Scheme for their recent award of £300 for the planting of new Oak Trees on the Cliff area.



An Honour for Marie.

One of the reasons that Radcliffe is such a nice place to live is its sense of community. If you choose, there is always something to do or somewhere to go – sports teams, The Scouts and Brownies, the Boys' Brigade, WEA evening classes, the U3A, the Drama Group, the Ladies Choir, the Male Voice Choir, the Women's Institute, the annual Carnival, the Village Show, the Gardening club, to name but a few. The British Legion, the schools, the churches, the public houses, and the Parish Council also play their part by organising musical evenings, clubs, quizzes and social events.

This sense of community, of belonging, doesn't just happen. With a few exceptions, the clubs and groups we all enjoy, are organised and run by volunteers. These people give freely of their time and skills to make the village a better place to live.

We are very proud that one Radcliffe resident who was born in Radcliffe on Trent, has been recognised for her efforts in the New Year's Honours. Mrs Marie Langdon has been awarded the British Empire Medal. Many villagers will know Marie from the Women's Institute, or from her days as a weekend volunteer at Radcliffe on Trent Police Station where she helped record the details of minor crimes. What they may not know is that she is one of the longest serving volunteer at Hayward House Hospice in Nottingham. Not only does she help brighten the lives of those people who are terminally ill, but she has also been an active fundraiser for the unit over many years.

Marie has also entered the 2013 Race of Life. She also walked 13.1 miles through London in her bra as part of the Half Moon Walk, raising more than £400 for breast cancer research. More recently, Marie has been active in organising the Village Show. In an Evening Post interview, Marie described herself as an "ordinary person". It is "ordinary" people like Marie that make Radcliffe on Trent the community that it is.

Planning and Environment

The Parish Council have hosted two public meetings to consider its view on planning applications for the large housing developments at Betts Farm, which is at the top of Shelford Road (400 houses) and the fields to the north of Nottingham Road, that are behind the RSPCA (300 houses). Many of you attended these events and were able to give your views for and against the proposals.

Parish Councillors listened very carefully to what was said and then gave their own views on the applications before voting. The result was that councillors were unanimously against both of the applications, in both cases the main reason given was that the proposals were to build within the Green Belt.

Rushcliffe Borough Council are in the process of carrying out a Green Belt review and it is likely that parts of the Green Belt will be changed. Should this happen any future planning applications affected by a change would have to be looked at again. Any future meetings would be open to the public (as are all Parish Council meetings) and every effort will be made to publicise them so that you have the chance to come along and if you wish, have your say.



Radcliffe Community Signing Choir to Conquer Jersey.

The Radcliffe Community Signing Choir, which began in September 2013 are hoping to reach new heights on 8th November this year. They are attending the Jersey Eisteddfod and competing in the only Signing Choir Class Competition in the UK.

The Signing Choir never have to worry about hitting a high note, because all their "Singing" is done in British Sign Language. They sign the songs along to backing

tracks and make music accessible to Deaf people but people with normal hearing also find the beauty of watching a signed song intriguing and are able to enjoy music in a visual way.

Signing Choirs are not a new thing to the village, Simon Astill, himself profoundly Deaf originally set up the South Nottinghamshire Academy Signing Choir in January 2012 with Nick Entwisle from the school. Parents soon took a keen interest and in September 2013 the Community Signing Choir was born.

Just before Christmas, the group performed Christmas songs in front of shoppers in Nottingham's Broadmarsh Centre and on March 26th they are performing at Carlton Central Junior School in Carlton.

Throughout the spring and summer they will be performing and raising money at various events to support their entry to the Jersey Eisteddfod. Simon is constantly looking for ways to raise their profile and challenge the choir but they don't come as big as the Eisteddfod.

"If we can inspire just a single person to show an interest in British Sign Language, Then that will make life a little easier for Deaf people" says Simon who cannot hear the music at all, but is supported by Sue Bailey-Douglas through their company Harmoneyes that also has a Community Signing Choir in Derby and perform themselves at venue's such as Wembley and London's O2 providing BSL versions of well-known songs for the masses.

The Radcliffe Community Signing Choir have recently been sponsored by M.A. Mills Funeral Service in the Village and are continually thriving to be active part of the Community.

The choir welcomes new members at any time. They rehearse every Wednesday during term time at South Nottinghamshire Academy from 6.30pm – 8pm and it costs £3.50 weekly to come along, learn some signs and songs and have a drink for more information, please contact admin@harmoneyes.org.uk

The White Rose



Imagine a country where it was forbidden to listen to foreign radio, with all aspects of the media and creative arts under direct government control. Where only the fittest were seen as worthy of life, euthanasia acceptable for those with physical or mental disabilities, and the role of women limited to breeding a master race. A country whose leader was obsessed with racial purity and an entire race of human beings was to be exterminated as an integral part of state policy. This was Nazi Germany.

Then, in 1942/3 go to Munich, home of Hitler's National Socialists where a small group of students and a professor of theology sought to expose this moral and political bankruptcy. Known as the White Rose they wrote and distributed 6 A4 pamphlets to lead a German resistance movement aimed at changing events in Germany They used their ecumenical Christianity, commitment to the humanist, liberal traditions of Europe "to fight this corrupt and poisonous system...We will not keep silent, we will be your bad conscience. The White Rose will leave you no peace." Having distributed their final leaflet at the University three of them were arrested, quickly brought to trial and then executed. Within the year the remaining three suffered in the same way.

A moving, dispassionate and thoroughly researched account of the significance of the White Rose was presented to the Radcliffe and District Probus Group by Hinrich Siefken. It provided a thought-provoking perspective on the role of individual Germans during the war.

Jeffery Dole Charity

Most of you will have heard of Jeffrey Limmer whose claim to fame is the Jeffrey Dole charity. Jeffrey was a wheelwright and he served as a churchwarden in 1614. There is no record of his wife, but his son William, died when quite young and left everything to his father. Both father and son were religious and when Jeffrey died he left bequests to friends, acquaintances and to the church.

The vicar was to have £3.6s.8d and Radcliffe church to have £10 to use at their discretion. His was the largest recorded bequest to the village poor during the 16th and 17th centuries. Jeffrey died on 8 August 1617 and Alice Wheatley (either his sister or sister in law) swore to carry out his wishes. His gift was managed by the churchwardens who lent out the money at interest. Other smaller bequests were made over the years and they were handled in the same way. By 1718 the monies were invested in land in the open fields and after these were enclosed in 1789, the poor were allocated land close to the centre of the village on Bingham Road. The profits from building leases on this land in Victorian times are still distributed annually. In 1885 the plaque you now see on screen was erected in the church to the memory of these early benefactors, headed by Jeffrey Limmer.

The charity is registered with the Charity Commissioners and is run under their supervision.

Historically, the Charity was administered ny nine Trustees, comprising the rector, two church wardens, a representative of the Parish Council (prior to the inception of the Parish Council it had been Overseer of the Poor), plus five other persons who must be property owners. Today it is administered by eight Trustees who are local residents, including the Vicar and members of the Parish Council. Trustees are not paid and not precluded from receiving gifts themselves.

The Radcliffe branch of the Buttercross Veterinary Centre opened in 1996 in a small shop on Bingham Road. This was a small Surgery and was used for consulting only.

In 2012, we moved to our current location near the mini roundabout on Main Road into what was the old Police Station. This is bigger and is now a full service providing surgery where we have an operating room, x-ray machine, ultrasound scanner, on site blood testing and separate cat and dog kennel rooms.

Our main surgery is on Long Acre in Bingham where it has been since 1994. Before that, the surgery operated from a house in Kirkhill near the level crossing, where we can trace its roots back to the 1960's, where the predominantly farm animals.

Over the two sites, we have three full time and four part time Vets and five registered Veterinary Nurses.

The subject of the watercolour now displayed in the Dowson Room of The Grange is of 'The Poplars' which was a grand house in the centre of Radcliffe on Trent where the road to the health centre and the row of shops which include the post office etc now stand. It was owned by Lord Manvers and was rented by John Green. The Green family (farmers) eventually moved to The Chestnuts. It was then bought by and lived in by Butler Parr who was a well known local cricketer and it then became known as 'The Butler Parr House'. As can be seen on the painting access to the house was over a footbridge. Under this bridge flowed the open Syke Drain and the house suffered from regular flooding and when a relative, also named Butler Parr, a brewery agent took over the house he decided enough was enough and built Field House in 1927 leaving The Poplars empty. It was demolished about 1938.

The current owner of the watercolour is a descendant of the Green family. He has loaned the painting to the Radcliffe Local History Society for his lifetime.

This watercolour is by Samuel Parrott who lived in Nottingham (1791-1876). He was a builder by trade but in the Directories of 1871 – 1874 he is listed as an Artist as well as a Builder. He was a landscape artist of some talent and showed 2 of his landscapes at the Mechanics Institute Exhibition in Nottingham. In 1841 he had a painting accepted by the Royal Academy. One of his paintings currently hangs in Nottingham Castle.

RadVentures

Many of you will have attended RadVentures events and more will have seen our posters. But what is RadVentures and what does it do? It brings professional entertainments to Radcliffe to be enjoyed 'on your doorstep' RadVentures is a group of villagers launched in 2004 in memory of Radcliffe resident Malcolm Thompson, a great enthusiast for the performing arts. The group brings professional artists on national tour to the village, largely through the national Village Ventures Rural Touring Scheme. Performers' fees are subsidised by Arts Council England, Nottinghamshire County Council and Rushcliffe Borough Council. This means that tickets are a fraction of the price of city centre venues.

We are now in our 10th year and have hosted an impressive 34 events, including music, theatre, dance and comedy.

As a voluntary group, we are non profit-making, with any surplus made from ticket sales invested back into the Radcliffe community.

It was RadVentures which commissioned the splendid black cast iron sign with a heron and the village in silhouette, gifted it to the village and erected it opposite the Co-op. We have also twice paid for professional entertainers for the Carnival and have funded Music Workshops at the Junior School and Drama & Dance at the Summer Play Days: a total of over £5000 in gifts to the community.

We are currently looking at ideas for our next gift to the village. Could it be sculpture or an information board for the newly acquired Lily Ponds to help identify plants and wildlife? If you have any suggestions, we would love to hear them.

What sort of place was Radcliffe on the outbreak of war in 1914? Which streets and landmarks would we recognise? How did residents earn a living? Where did they live? Were they all Radcliffe born and bred?

What part did the village play in the war effort?
Where did the combatants serve? How many died?
What was life like for those at home?

Did the soldiers return to a 'Land fit for heroes'?

What was the village's role in caring for hundreds of wounded soldiers? How was the village changed by the war?

How were the fallen remembered?

These and many other questions will be addressed in an exhibition to be held at Radcliffe British Legion from Saturday 2nd to Sunday 10th August 2014, to mark the hundredth anniversary of the outbreak of war.

The story of Radcliffe and WW1, told through soldiers' letters and diaries, photos, maps and official records, has been researched by members of Radcliffe University of the Third Age. It has been supported by a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund.
